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


# Reimagined Eubie Blake Extravaganza comes to Karamu

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# Martin Luther King Jr. Day Events



- The Museum of Contemporary Art is hosting a series of events beginning at 11a focused on direct action in the spirit of Dr. King. Kicking off the day will be a Teach-in with Dr. Hasan Kwame Jeffries. An associate professor of history at Ohio State and member of the Kirwan Institute for the Study of Race and Ethnicity, Jeffries's first book, *Bloody* Lowndes: Civil Rights and Black Power in Alabama's Black Belt, tells the story of the ordinary, everyday folk who transformed a bastion of white supremacy into a fount of black power. Other programs on the day's agenda include a session on affirmative political sign making with artist and activist Favianna Rodriguez,

was planning to bestow a Humanitarian Award upon County Executive Armond Budish, we asked aloud whether civil rights activism was dead in Cleveland. Not long after that page one query, Ellen Connally reported over at coolcleveland.com that Budish gave Cleveland SCLC a \$5000 contribution on December 31, pretty much engraving a price tag on the plaque.

So now the question might be, which is deeper, the Cleveland SCLC's depravity or Budish's desperation.

This has been a tough week for the county executive. Besides appearing to buy an empty honor on the cheap, three of his top administrators, including a member of his cabinet, were indicted for various alleged crimes and misdemeanors. While there is no reason to suspect Budish of breaking any laws, even his friends are coming around to the view that the county's chief executive is over his head.

Even the announcement that the Quicken Loans Arena expansion topped off this week with placement of the top girder could only have been small consolation for the beleaguered Budish. For his growing legion of critics, it was a reminder that a) the County was snookered on the deal, b) the jail crisis illuminates there were wiser choices for county investment than expanding a sports arena, and c) he reneged on solemn promise to find the funds to establish new mental health facilities that quite possibly could have saved some of the eight lives lost by those in the county lockup since June.

That Budish is flailing should be no surprise. He slid into the executive's chair with no demonstrable managerial experience beyond having presided over a tiny law firm. His short and undistinguished legislative record was leveraged primarily by his fundraising prowess and some fortunate political timing.

It is hard to imagine that the Budish political career will last beyond 2021 when his current term will end, if indeed he toughs it out that long. And county prosecutor Michael O'Malley, who has been demonstrating a healthy independent streak, appears unlikely to cut the Budish administration any slack.

There is likely no shortage

of candidates who would love to replace Budish in what was envisioned at the time of county reorganization as the second most powerful elected office in the state.

But nine years into this new form of county government, voters are still waiting for the man or woman who could make that vision something more than a daydream.

## What to Watch

This coming Tuesday, the day after Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, SEIU Local 1 Cleveland Janitors and SEIU Local 1199, will launch their fight for a new contract with a path to a \$15 hourly wage. The campaign will kick off with a rally at the Tri-C Metro Campus.

According to its website, SEIU claims to be "the fastest-growing union in North America." Its roughly 2 million members make it the largest health care union, with 900,000 members, including nurses, LPNs, doctors, lab technicians, nursing home workers, home care workers; the largest property services union, with 225,000 members in the building cleaning and security industries, including janitors, door men and women; and the largest public services union, with 850,000 local and state government workers, public school employees, bus drivers, and child care providers.

## Reimagined Eubie Blake Extravaganza comes to Karamu



Shuffle Along, originally produced in 1921, was one of the most significant musicals of the 20th century. The historian Harold Cruse, writing in his magisterial work, The Crisis of the Negro Intellectual, called it "the most outstanding Negro achievement in the theater since the Negro broke with the old minstrel form in the 1890s." Writing in 1967, Cruse said it had yet to be equaled or surpassed, as it had set a new standard for the American stage musical.

Shuffle Along was written and performed entirely by African Americans. It brought the Harlem Renaissance to Broadway, and paved the way for the integration of theaters in New York City and across the country.

Bill Rudman, executive director of The Musical Theatre Project, and Karamu House CEO Tony Sias, have written The Impact of Shuffle Along, a multi-media concert version of the 1920s musical. Their production will enjoy its world premiere Feb. 7-10 at Karamu House, 2355 East 89 St. [44106]. The Sunday matinee is already sold out.

Impact, which celebrates the contributions of the legendary African-American musical theatre team of ragtime composer Eubie Blake and lyricist Noble Sissle, is a partnership between Karamu and The Musical Theater Project. The concert will combine performances of 19 songs, six videos, five dances and two poems by Langston Hughes. It will feature Treva Offutt, Justin C. Woody, Evelyn Wright, and The Joe Hunter Trio and ragtime pianist George Foley.


